FIRE President Greg Lukianoff opined on the Orwellian nature of Michigan State University's (MSU's) Student Accountability in Community (SAC) program in today's issue of The Detroit News. In December, FIRE publicly challenged MSU to dismantle the SAC program, which forces students whose behaviors or attitudes are considered unacceptable to undergo mandatory ideological reeducation at their own expense. MSU told FIRE it would review the program, but as of now it is still in place. In today's editorial, Lukianoff reiterated that the SAC program is an unconstitutional violation of students' right to freedom of conscience, and that it must be abolished. Our Proposal

Having thoroughly reviewed Marywood's existing policy for free speech rights, we have come up with a very straightforward proposal that will enshrine free speech rights at Marywood in a way that protects the rights of students and faculty while preserving Marywood's distinct institutional identity. Our proposal has two simple steps:

1) Marywood claims to adhere to the American Association of University Professors' *Joint Statement on Rights and Freedoms of Students*. This statement is a very thoughtful proclamation of academic freedoms (though it only applies to students), and Marywood's administrators are wise to seek its guidance; however, <u>Marywood's adherence to this</u> statement must be clearly stated in the student handbook.

2) The Joint Statement on Rights and Freedoms of Students provides a strong foundation for academic freedom on campus, but it has two weaknesses that Marywood must address. First off, it states clearly that schools "[have] an obligation to clarify those standards that it considers essential to its educational mission and its community life." Secondly, the statement also does not apply to faculty members and its protections must be extended to them outside of the classroom, as well. In order to prevent administrators from using Marywood's values or political correctness as an excuse to censor legitimate speech by students or faculty members that they disagree with, Marywood must thus clearly state that it believes the First Amendment of the US Constitution is the standard by which faculty and student speech and expression should be judged. Marywood should codify the following statement as official policy:

"Marywood University shall not make or enforce any rule subjecting any student or faculty member to disciplinary sanction solely on the basis of conduct that is speech or other communication that, when engaged in outside the Marywood campus, is protected from governmental restriction by the U.S. Constitution."
